

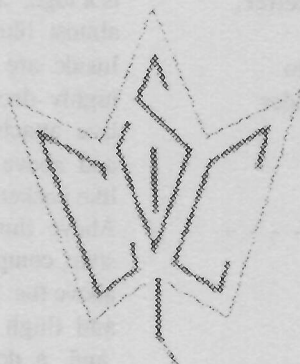

Some of us were busy stockpiling merchandise for fall shows and the Christmas rush, others may have decided to take the summer off to just enjoy the fabulous weather. Well, the kids are safely in school learning their ABC's, and its time for all of us to get back to work furthering our leather education.

Our first priority is the organization of Leather 98. We have already procured a display site, and judging will take place on Thursday October 30, 1997. That means that your entries must be ready approximately one month from the time you read this message. If each one of you starts a piece right now, there is no reason why it cannot be completed by the judging date.

Why is it important to participate? First, this is our only public display of our work and therefore our best opportunity to attract new members. Second, with the executive's approval, I want to aggressively advertise this event, hopefully in the local paper, on community cable television and possibly on radio. If we are going to go to all the trouble to advertise the event, it would be helpful if there were actually completed works there for the public to view. If you only have time to do a key case, that's fine. Participation in the show is sorely needed and would be greatly appreciated, regardless of the size of the completed project. It is our job as leather crafters to educate the public in the versatility and possibilities of our leather medium.

I hope we will be able to have a flyer that we can distribute to craft stores, libraries and the media, which will help us increase awareness of our guild in each town where meetings are held.

Please take a few minutes while you are reading this bulletin to think about how you can contribute to the success of this show.

This is just one of about ten or fifteen articles given to me by **Rene Hackstetter**, this past summer.

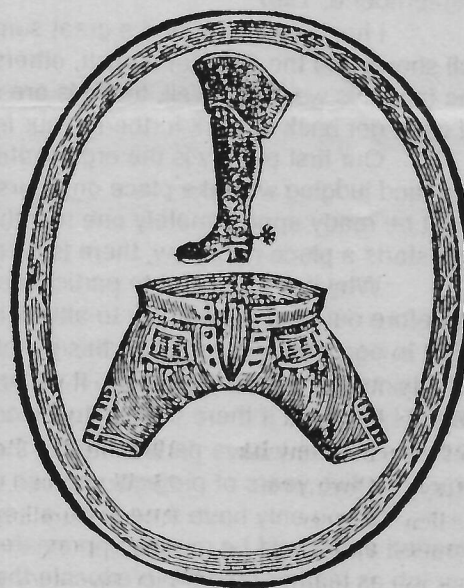

What makes the age of this ad even more noteworthy is the type of type used, and puts it at least 200 yrs ago, was the use of mid-word "s" was in Old English form, that is to say an "f" without the crossbar, but only in the middle of words, the proper "S" was used to begin all words, especially capitals. Another odd part of the older type, was that the final "s" on words like doors, sorts, breeches and rates was a standard small "s".

For fun, try and write and pronounce "Bifhopfgate" as I first did. Remember that there is no cross-bar on the "f". Intriguing is'nt it. (Bishopsgate)

On top of Mr. James Potter ad is a logo, a decorated vertical Oval, almost like a carved belt, no buckle. Inside are a pair of men's breeches, highly decorated, with some form of lace attachments, at the front fly area, and above the knees, plus what look like pockets at both sides on the tummy. Above this is a boot, almost Wellington style, complete with a flared leather cuff above the knee unit, to protect the knee and thigh. On the heel area is a Spur, and a deep set heel for going into a stirrup. I am glad I could copy it for you so you can see it yourself.

EPHEMERA

Another in the series of articles from **Rene Hackstetter's** inquiring pen.

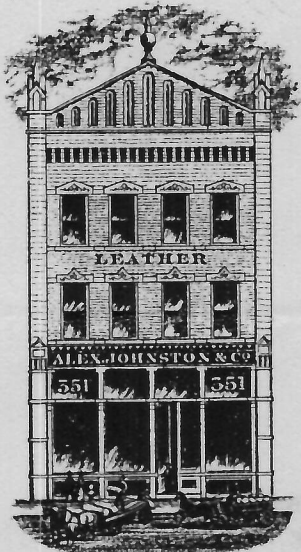
Once your interest in a field of study has been sparked you find yourself collecting "Ephemera". These are all those bits of paper, such as letterheads, invoices, Cartes de Visite, and trade cards that often end up in the garbage when a desk gets cleaned out, or get thrown out when a business of a company ends or dies.

This first invoice to the **Rev. John G. Scott** from **Alex Johnston and Co.** for a **\$38.00** Leather Trunk might have been a substantial purchase for 1889.

It makes us wonder if **Rev. Scott** was preparing himself for a move out of the Diocese, to parts unknown. He was served by the owner of what appears, in the engraving, to be a substantial **Importer and Dealer in Leather and Findings**.

The second cut of the **Adams Harness Co.** is a letterhead showing the enterprise located at **176 & 178 King St. E. Toronto**, with carriages, wagons, Street Railway (Trams) and a bicyclist. The building still exists at the corner of George and King Sts. though the business is long gone. Their "**Brandon House**" operation was in Manitoba, serving Western Canadian trade. The letter signed by one of the owners is responding to a Mr. Waddell of Orono to clarify if the **Backstrap** and **Dock** of his Harness are included in the original price. They are not, as Mr. Adams indicates, included, however the **Co.** is willing to include them for **75 cents** and send them with the goods.

The horse drawn wagons, loaded with bundles of harness leathers are probably heading to some Mennonite farmer in the area with orders, plus the old King street tram has a pole up to the electric wire, this service started in 1899.

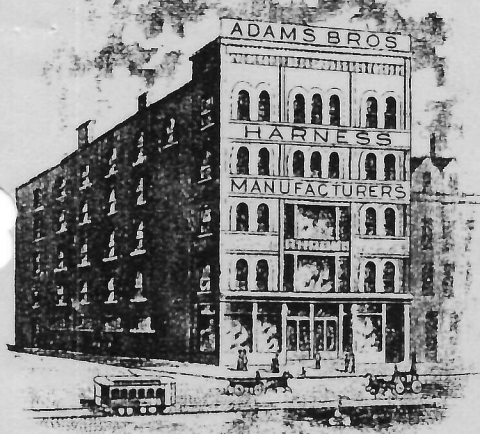

CLIFF McTAVISH RAISED INLAY BUCKLE

Materials Required: Large Oval Buckle Blank 3-4 oz. Leather--8" x 5 1/2", Morocco Leather, Piece of 1 1/2 - 2 oz. leather used to line top piece, Thread, Glue--White or Contact, Edge Dye

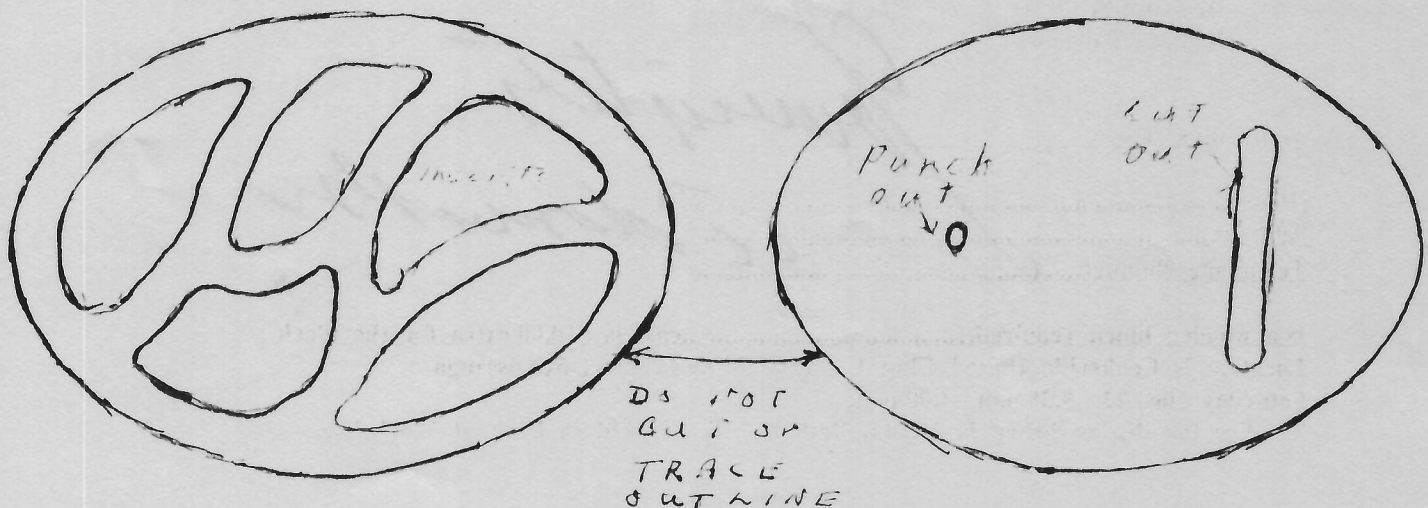
Tools: Cutting Surface, Sharp Pointy Knife or Scalpel, Skiving Knives, Dividers that will scratch a line, Bone Folders, Rotary or Small Punches 00, Stitching Groovers, Stitching Wheel #7, Stitching Awl, Needles and Thread

- Steps to be done at Home:**
1. Make a Tracing Pattern
 2. Cut a piece of 3-4 oz. leather 8" x 5 1/2". Dye leather desired colour. Choose a piece of Morocco about 6" x 5". Smaller pieces can be used as long as they are about 1/2" bigger all around than the size of the insert pieces on the tracing pattern. Choose a colour that compliments the colour you dyed. Also a piece of leather 4" x 5" will be needed to line the top piece. A scrap piece will do, as long as it is thin 1 1/2-- 2 oz.
 3. When leather is almost dried, trace patterns on leather.
 4. The cut out and punch out parts, on the bottom piece can be done now. The outside line is there just to show shape. **Do Not Trace or Cut** this line. The Top Piece is left for the Workshop. Again the outside line on the tracing pattern is there just to show shape. You don't need to trace (it will mark the leather) or cut this line (it may be a different after you mold it over the belt buckel blank, because of the complex curves)

Tracing pattern;- **Remember, do not trace or cut outside line on leather**

LASTED BOXES WORKSHOP

INSTRUCTOR:--RUTH HAIG

BITS AND THINGS NEEDED

BASSWOOD BLOCK --ie 3" x 6 1/2" x 2" cost \$10.00

Basswood is used because no wood grain telltails
to mark leather, and tacks go in easily and hold.

Lasting Pliers, to pull and hold the leather as you mold and
tack it. Fine Lockjaw Pliers that are clean with no oil
or grease traces or small upholstrey stretcher.
(lasting pliers 2" curved)

Knives-- all the usual knives, bone folder, scissors, cutting board,
sponge and water jug, dye if you wish, wallpaper
heat gun, or Hair dryer, **Hammer**,for tacks.

Tacks-- box of shoemakers tacks 9/16" or slightly longer
Capital Findings, or Home Hardware , other types of tacks
will not work. They tend to fall out.

Sandpaper--Fine and Medium grit

Leather-- 6-7 oz. or 7-8 oz cowhide , 2 pieces, top and bottom
about 15" square.

Skiver-- Enough to line the box, at least 1' - 15" square

NOTE: If lighter leather is used apply a coat of fiberglass
then activator to the **inside** of the bottom and the lid,
use a well ventilated area for fiberglassing
this makes the shell more stabile,,and ridgid, but also
another ballgame.
