Perhaps, as we approach the millennium and the **50th** Anniversary of C.S.C.L. (in the year 2000) members will again, prepare a square to add to our quilt. New members are encouraged to try a square--it must be 6" x 6" of any kind of leather--design, colour, cut, carve, tool, emboss, etc.--be creative!

All members are welcome to do a millennium square--
What does the Year 2000 mean to you-- Express your thoughts in leather.

LONDON NEWS FOOTNOTES

DOROTHY McPHERSON

WESTERN ONTARIO FAIR

In September two London Members- at- Large **Marion Kehoe** and **David McPherson** demonstrated leather crafting at the **Western Fair**, and **Dorothy McPherson** also demonstrated her leathercrafted Jewellery and other creations in the **London Free Press Building**.

Since moving to London, **McPherson's** have been a volunteer demonstrators at **Fanshawe Pioneer Village----** **Dorothy** quilting in the newly opened **Millinery Shop** and **David** demonstrating Leathercrafting in the **Harness Shop**. **Marion Keyhole**, also a Member-at-Large has also been demonstrating leathercrafting at the **Harness Shop** for the past few years.

LEATHERCRAFT AND THE MILLENIUM

Over this past summer, I made a mistake which has greatly impacted my leathercraft production. I bought a computer. This was a decision I have been wrestling with for a number of years, and had until that time resisted the urge to launch myself into cyber space. Being involved in an age-old craft, such as I am, it seemed appropriate for me to scoff at computers, and continue to be dragged kicking and screaming into the 21st century. Although I do have a few dents in my forehead from banging it on my desk, I have been pleasantly surprised that these infernal electronic paperweights do actually have their uses.

About 6 weeks ago, I decided to get hooked up to the Internet through my cable provider, and the world of leather has opened before my very eyes. Having unlimited access to the Internet is both a boon and the bane of my existence. In the first three days I was "connected" to the world, I spent at least 50 hours surfing the Net, making contact with people all around the globe. My shoulders ached, my head listed curiously to one side, my posterior was numb and I had a curious little pain running down my right arm, but in the end, it was all worth it. I am now talking to leathercrafters in Western Canada, the United States, Europe and Australia.

The other great thing about the Internet is visiting websites, and I would like to share with you, some of the information I have collected. I know not all of you have computers, but you may have family or friends who can print information for you, so I would like to list and review some of the sites I have stumbled upon in the middle of the night.

I will list the company name for you and the URL (stands for Uniform Resource Locator) which is basically the address where you can find the information. For those of you unfamiliar with the Internet, all you need to do is select a search engine, like "Infoseek" for example, type in the URL, EXACTLY as I have typed it, press enter, and the computer does the rest of the search for you. So here goes. There is no particular order at all.

Leathercrafter's Corner <http://www.tiac.net/users/hollyoak/lthcraft.htm>

This site has some excellent information on parchment making, boots and shoes, cuir bouilli, leather tooling and medieval stitching. It also lists resource books for saddlery, bottles and blackjacks, bookbinding and knife sheaths. This site is still under construction, and I have noticed that over the past few weeks, new information is gradually being added.

The International Internet Leathercrafter's Guild <http://www.iilg.org/>

The main feature of this site is a gallery of works by leather artisans around the world, most notably Silva Fox in the United States, and Peter Main from Australia. It also has information about trade shows in the United States, a Hall of Fame where they put a shine on Al Stohlman's halo, the most complete listing of Doodle Pages I have ever seen, and a listing of links that can take you to other leather related websites.

Sod Hoppers Footwear & Ethical Jewellery <http://www.sodhoppers.com/moccasin.htm>

The designs and colour combinations of these moccasins will knock your socks off!!! I have never seen anything like this in my days of doing leather work. Some of the work is very intricately appliqued using several types of leather. Truly a joy to behold.

Angel Masks and Fantasy Art <http://www.angel-mask.com>

These masks can either be hung on the wall, displayed on a bust, or worn on the face and some of them are quite spectacular. They are obviously moulded over a form, but there is another technique that has been utilized as well to give them a very dramatic flare. Quite worth your while to have a look at these.

Daphne of Canada <http://www.makersgallery.com/daphne/>

Daphne Lingwood, as most of you know, is a past member of the CSCL, and this website is basically a collection of some of her flower jewellery, and free standing leather sculptures, along with a bio of Daphne herself.

The Leather Art Gallery <http://www.leatherartgallery.org/>

This is another gallery of artisans work, but it is still under construction and much of what is already in place seems to come and go from day to day. There seems to be server problems with it at the moment, which I can only assume they are going to try to correct.

Silva Fox Artistry <http://www.inergy.com/FOXART/main.htm>

This site is a real gem for anyone who enjoys carving. Silva Fox was the 1997 winner of the Al Stohlman Award, and one look at her work tells you why. Several of her hand sculpted leather pictures are depicted here with close-ups so you can truly appreciate the detail. She also has a page called "How's That Done?", where you can see stage by stage how some of the carving is done. There is also a profile of the artist section, and a list of her special awards. This is an absolute must see not only for the carving and the embossing of the pictures, but the bold way in which they are coloured as well. There are some leather related links to follow here as well.

So there you have it folks! This is the first installment of leathercraft Internet-style. I am hoping that this will be a semi-regular feature of the bulletin. I have other sites I can mention in the next bulletin, but if there are some of you already on the web and you have some leather sites bookmarked, please let me know about them. Or better yet, do a write-up like this and submit them to our editors Don and Kevin. They are always looking for new things to put in the bulletin, and would greatly appreciate anything you can give them.
