Happy Canada Day!

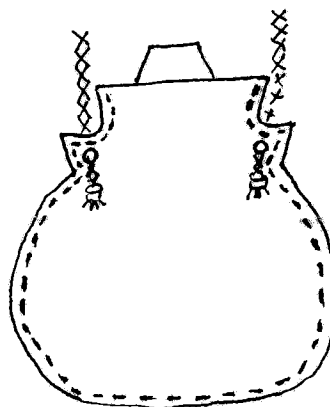

CSCL 45th ANNUAL

The Woodstock Branch hosted this year's CSCL Annual and welcomed members from Toronto, Hamilton, Mississauga, and Norland Branches as well as a few members-at-large. Numbers were down this year but Loreen Manuel, Beula Reynolds, and Nancy Wilson, who manned the registration table, had everyone sign cards to be sent to those who could not attend due to illness. The convention nametags were made by Beula and Loreen.

The first event of the weekend, following set-up of the branch displays and short executive meeting, was a slide/tape presentation celebrating 45 years of CSCL leather. The slides, set to classical and contemporary music, illustrated not only the wonderful leather of years past but also some of the people who have made CSCL the fine organization it is today. The Fellows and Associates then returned to the display room to judge the articles of this past year's work for Salon and Craftsman ribbons.

Saturday morning was a bustle of activity with friends meeting, registrations and membership fees being paid, and coffee brewing. President Don MacLeod called the business part of the Annual to order shortly after 10 a.m. Following the reports of last year, and a presentation of ribbons for the 1994 Biennial Exhibition, Don called on Madeleine Mitchell to present an Honourary Life Membership to Hilda Chynoweth, Norland. The new slate of Executive Officers was read by Ruth Haig. Ruth presented Don with a Past President's pin for three years of service to CSCL. Jack Meharg presented Hamilton Branch with

the 1995 Weston Trophy. Only one other branch, Toronto, participated in this year's branch competition. Come on, Mississauga, Woodstock, and Norland get started now on your 1996 entry!

Nancy Durham welcomed CSCL members to Woodstock and announced events for the rest of Saturday and Sunday. This year's Question Box then followed with discussion among members about solutions to the questions.

Saturday's buffet lunch was followed by two demonstrations in the display room. Carol McLean, FCSC, who has become a world-renowned quilting teacher, returned to CSCL to present **Decorative Design Concepts**. She discussed elements of design and how to find ideas for design just about anywhere. At the same time, David McPherson, ACSCL, demonstrated **Acrylic Rubs** to produce subtle colour and dramatic effects. Mid-afternoon brought cheers and claps as the draw tables were emptied by lucky ticket holders.

Muriel McKnight, ACSCL, Hamilton Branch, demonstrated tips for successful **Leather Tooling**. Some members got a chance to try the technique with Muriel's skilled help. Meanwhile, at the other end of the room, Al Williams, Woodstock member from Sarnia, shared his wealth of knowledge about **Unique Tool Sharpening** with CSCL onlookers.

As the afternoon drew to a close the last of the prizes was picked up. Then The Curiosity Table yielded up some of its secrets: Labrador sealskin boots, trog, antique container with leather inlaid top, glove stitching stand, and ostrich fan holder. CSCL members relaxed until the evening gala.

The evening banquet preceded the real purpose of the evening -

celebration, fun, and hugs. Don MacLeod conducted his last duty as president as he presided over the evening events which included presentations by Dorothy Muma of Craftsman and Salon ribbons, and a thank you to the host Woodstock Branch. Nancy Durham called upon branch members to stand to be recognized. She then introduced the evening speakers. Reverend Roger McCombe presented a laughter-filled hour of warmth and happiness. In spite of the recent passing of his father, Roger delighted the audience and stayed to hear the second speaker, Lois Bradfield. A former teacher, Lois entertained in the style of Hee Haw's "Minnie Pearl" complete with hat, sales tag, and bloomers under her skirt. Following Minnie's light-hearted humour CSCL members took down the displays and relaxed for the evening.

A bright Sunday morning brought together a group of CSCLers intent on making Dream Catchers coached by Nancy Durham. Following the workshop, members said goodbye to Woodstock and the 45th Annual weekend.

WESTON TROPHY ENTRIES**

HAMILTON BRANCH (78.8%)

Pocket secretary (Muriel McKnight). Good choice of leather; stitching and edge tooling very nice. Design tooling could have been deeper. 68.3%

Hiking bag (Betsy Rennie). Closure is a bit difficult to open; stitching could be improved; very rich colour. 71.6%

Ranger belt (Ruth Haig). Colour and design simple yet elegant. 91.6%

Blue box (David McPherson). Nicely fitting lid; great colour and shape. 87.5%

Tote bag (David Windeyer). Excellent braiding; good choice of leather; perhaps should have had rounded holes for the braided closure. 75%

TORONTO BRANCH (62%)

Trucker's log (Alan Foss). Very functional article; lacing joints require more attention; border design missing on back; pleasing dye job. 73%

Keycase (Cal Lucas). Excellent hardware; carving could be improved; interesting dye job. 53%

Jewellery (Kayna Ooyevaar). Lovely colour; pleasing to the eye. 74%

Wallet (Jim Edwards). Leather choice somewhat heavy; stitching could be improved; nice colour. 47%

Mandella (Bruce White). Hoop could be wrapped more evenly; dye too heavy on the eagle head; general carving area bulges; overall pleasing design. 63%

IN MEMORIAM

Lorna Robson, ACSCL, Hamilton Leather Guild, passed away November 1994. Lorna was born in the Niagara Peninsula area and joined CSCL and the local guild in the 1950s. Lorna studied leather techniques and their application at a summer course at Banff School of Fine Arts. For many years Lorna, along with Bea Austin, taught leather at YWCA camps. Tooling, embossing, and work with morocco were her favourites.

Lorna was a legal secretary in Niagara and Hamilton, a Past President and Secretary of the Hamilton Leather Guild, and a secretary to her father and brother who ran a grist mill in Fonthill. Lorna will be missed by us all.

Lea Love, long-time CSCL member of the Toronto Branch and later founding member of the new Mississauga Branch, passed away November 1994. Lea was known for his leather carving and tooling. Lea, a chartered accountant, was a faithful CSCL executive member and fine treasurer from 1984 to 1994. He put Toronto Branch finances in order, as well as those of the Society.

Lea was an early customer of Ed R. Lewis Leathers, a general supplier of leather and possibly findings during the 1930s. Apparently, in the thirties, one of Ed R. Lewis' sons, Fred, started a leathercraft section for the company which later became Lewiscraft.

Lea took a leather course, part of YMCA Leadership Training. Afterward he started a leathercraft group which he conducted for almost four years. He further demonstrated his leadership ability in his Stamp Group involvement. Survived by his wife, he will be remembered for his voluntarism which greatly benefitted CSCL.

Art Harris who recently joined the Hamilton Leather Guild and CSCL passed away suddenly May 1995. As well as carved belts, Art assembled photo albums. Our sympathy is extended to his wife Eva who is also a member of CSCL and past membership chairman of the local branch.

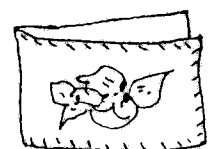

The exhibition continues at the OCC (416-977-3551) until August 27.

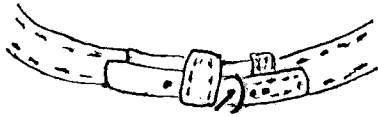

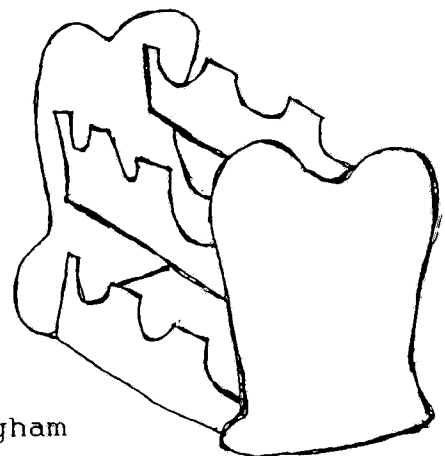

WORKSHOP: expanding leather with sand to make a leather bottell.
Instructor: Bill Whittingham.

Pre-registration is necessary with a minimum of 15 participants required in order for the course to be offered. If the required number sign up, material lists and preliminary instructions will be mailed to each participant.

When signing up please include name, address, phone number and indicate if you need bees wax to waterproof your bottell. It is important to state if you need bees wax. To waterproof his bottells, Bill bakes the wax right into the leather and then does two final coats inside after the bottell has cooled down. This requires about a half pound of bees wax, so if you need it, he must contact his supplier ahead of time. Cost of wax is reasonable.

JOHNNY'S RED UMBRELLA

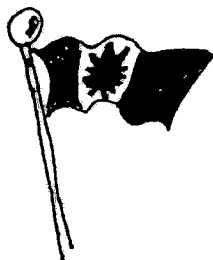
While the United States was often referred to as 'Uncle Sam', and England as 'John Bull', Canada in the late 1800's was referred to as 'Johnny Canuck'.
