Tandy, USA, does plan to continue their warehousing, wholesale, direct mail-order and Internet business from the Head Office and Warehouse location in Ft. Worth, Texas.

General comments on articles for 1999 Annual General Meeting

We were so pleased with the quality of articles submitted for Weston Trophy judging this year. Our job was difficult but very interesting. It was a pleasure to examine these pieces and see the creative spirit flourishing in beautifully crafted leather pieces. Your dedication to the craft is to be commended.

Woodstock

Morocco Hand Bag- nice design, pleasing pattern, excellent lacing.

Tray- Great design, nice finish, edges could have been finished a bit more

Box- A well fitted lid, colour good, inlay well done, back seam just a little stick.

Picture Frame- Corners nicely done, closes well, Cut out ovals not symmetrical.

Mississauga

Mask- very well done project, lovely colour, nicely sculptured.

Key Basket- Unique design, ambitious piece, good colour, bottom is not level, Sole leather would have improved the bottom.

Riding Crop- Excellent braiding, a very functional utility item.

Zippered Case- Excellent colouring, unique article, zipper placement excellent, -out of this world.

Hamilton

Desk Pad- 3d effectively done, Morocco leather not over worked.

Bottell- nice design, but not symmetrical, very difficult article.

Oval Box- Ambitious project, interior space is very small in proportion to the box size.

Knife Sheath- nicely carved, saddle stitching excellent, pleasing article, inner welt holds knife secure, very functional item.

Toronto

Chess Set- another ambitious endeavor, the chess pieces are quaint, a good sturdy board.

Pins- not really major enough for a trophy competition submission article, The craft person should be encouraged to expand her horizons for the future competition pieces, perhaps in a larger piece of work.

Pencil Box- opening too small for a number of pencils, perhaps counter-sunk stones should be mounted solidly, stacking a bit uneven.

Bridle- Braiding different and very effective, several techniques used and very effectively, nicely finished.

It went well! Registration was carried out by Al Foss himself, he had all the tickets and goody bags as the members registered at his desk. To give him a relief at various times, Phyllis McHale, from Norland took over the registration desk. During this time the Club tables were being set up for the judging. all five clubs filled their table and set them up to be as attractive and presentable that they could. All tables were actually loaded. The variety of leather items was outstanding.

We bought our Supper in their dinning room on the main floor overlooking the harbour. A full scale replica of Christopher Columbus's "Santa Marie" is pulled up on the shore at the north side of the harbour. To think a ship like it actually crossed the Atlantic Ocean is really something. Its big but not that big to trust for a three month plus voyage into the unknown.

After supper Peter Gross put on a workshop with Stamping tools, it developed into a wild demo. Peter carried in a big box of stamping tools he brought with him from George Hurst in Texas. These were new tools that George Hurst had made in Japan on his recent trip. They worked beautifully, clean, sharp images. Pick up a tool and Peter demo'd what he could do with it, as a feature design, backgrounder, or build a feature article with it. It was after 10.00 p.m. when the demo broke up, a good evening was held by everyone.

The Fellows took over the meeting room and judged all the articles on the club tables, as we were in Peter's demo. One table was set up with the Weston Trophy entries that had been judged on April 1, at Bill Whittinghams home. We would learn the winners after the Annual Meeting on Saturday. We would learn the results of the table entries at the banquet Saturday night.

Saturday saw the Annual meeting chaired by Bill Whittingham and recording secretary Kevin Armstrong to take all the proceedings in stone. The meeting went smoothly. Then finally the Weston Trophy winners were announced Hamilton again won the coveted trophy, The articles are described and the marks attained by the teams are on another page, in this issue.

Before the meeting Joyce Scruton and Jack Meharg sold the Draw tickets. Joyce sold the tickets and collected the money and Jack (he with the longest arm span) measured out the tickets. An arms length for \$5.00 or about 40 tickets.

After lunch we had 2 workshops. First Madeleine Mitchell doing a slip on book cover and showing how to measure to make a pattern so it would fit properly, and the order to stitch it together, so it wouldn't bunch up.

The second workshop by Bill Whittingham was a demo on spray dying using skiver. He crunched up the dry skiver, sprayed a light coat of colour over it, hitting the highlights. He crunched the piece again and added another colour. He repeated the process about 5-6 times, each with a different colour of dye. The effect was outstanding, reminded me of the old fashioned Periwinkle dyed purse liner. Your colour combinations make completely different look to the pieces you use the skiver on.

During the intervals , before the Demos and between them and finally after them, the draw tickets were pulled and announced by Jack Meharg. He kept saying I won to many last year in Norland (22) , well I only won 8 this year.

The Draw tables had great variety of articles to ponder over and to choose from, and people took their time to pick their treasures.

Al Foss was Master of Ceremonies for the Banquet Evening. Art Cousins said Grace, then the staff brought in the food. I don't think anyone went away hungry. It was a family type meal served. The food was great, Wine-Red or White, Salad, Pasta, Roast Beef , Baked Potatoes, and all the trimmings. Desert was Cherry Cheesecake.

They the winners for the Special Draws after everyone was in a fully settled mood. Then Al introduced our Guest Speaker, Mr. Konzelmann from his family Winery at Niagara-on-the-Lake, We had all enjoyed the wine at dinner and continued to while he spoke to savor the fruits of his labors. He told how his family had come from Germany and established their site at Niagara where they found the soil could give them the best results and flavour from the soil. A very informative discussion followed with him answering questions from the floor

After the banquet we disassembled our display tables and started to pack up.

A very informative and worthwhile week-end, We now are looking forward to the 50th Anniversary Annual with Woodstock as our hosts next spring.

When a southern gentleman married and the couple returned from their honeymoon to their home (Mansion), the Lady was given the little basket filled with the keys for all the doors in the mansion. She had complete control of all the rooms.

I saw it for about 20 secs. on T.V. show and compared to the mans hand it looked about a two quart size. I got the idea then and there, and started with a paper model to see how to make it, and get the angles correct. I then proceeded into a leather form. I had to change a few ideas as it developed, but the basic Idea stayed the same, and the size never changed.

I am still very proud of the finished product and the Salon ribbon I received for it.
