NATURAL RUSSET LEATHERS

This is an article written by one of the earliest Presidents of the Society in 1952.

Fred Brown asked us if we would reprint this article.

A discussion about some important craft characteristics of russet leathers.

Probably no other tannage or finish of leather is so important to the decorative leathercraftsman.

An understanding of the term "russet leather" is necessary for the student craftsman for appreciate its special craft possibilities. The term "russet" suggests different meaning to different branches of the leather industry.

"Russet" may refer to colour, or to tannage, or both. Hides and skins which are subjected to the ling and involved process of "vegetable" (bark) tanning are rendered into leather of a type most suitable for ornamenting and finishing with the hand tools and materials of the decorative leathercraftsman.

When referring to colour, it should be understood that no colouring agents are added leathers during tanning. Variations from light to dark natural russet result from different vegetable extracts favoured by different tanneries for their special products. Certain very light russet leathers may, however, undergo an extra "bleaching out" process.

Skins, hides and sides which have been "vegetable tanned" but not further finished, are often referred to as being "in the crust". It is at this stage that serious grading or sorting is commenced for the many industrial, manufacturing and craft uses expected of russet leathers. By far, the greater bulk of vegetable tanned

russet leathers whether calfskins, horsehides, cowhides, sheepskins, goatskins, pigskins, buffalo hides, and others, are made for industrial and manufacturing purposes, while selection for use by handcraftsman is only incidental as far as volume of pieces tanned is concerned. The natural russet finished leathers which are finally selected for fine personal leather goods and for use by decorative leathercraftsmen number well under 5% of the total of the many hundreds of thousand of pieces tanned each year.

It is well, therefore, for the leathercraft instructor and student to keep this fact constantly in mind, as beginner leathercraftsmen are generally much too prone to insist that their craft leather be "blemish free". While industrial and manufacturing users of vegetable tanned russet leathers (as well as of coloured bark tanned products) have many ways of using 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and even 5th grade leathers, they too must claim a reasonable share of the comparatively limited supply of #1 selected pieces completing the long process of making leather at the tannery. Because of the numerous factors which may cause natural and accidental markings of hides and skins during growth (see article "What is Good Leather" Bulletin No 2, 1951), the finding of really "blemish free" skins or hides is so rare among tanners as to be all but a nil factor for those who, through ignorance, try to insist on "blemish free" super sections for all orders.

It is up to the Craftsman - to discover and understand the limitations of leather as a natural product, while, at a

challenging craft material. Experience will suggest how numerous natural markings may be included in your work without detracting, but in some cases even enhancing the final appearance of a well planned, carefully worked and finished leathercraft article.

Following are some important characteristics, problems and possibilities to explore when working with natural russet leathers:

Advantages - a good material for beginner students, as it show in clear detail the effects of tooling upon leather.
-natural russet leathers offer the best medium for modelling, incising, embossing, carving, or stamping techniques for decorating.
-well planned and carefully worked, natural russet tooling and carving leathers can result in finished articles displaying the maximum of a craftsman's "capacity" with leather.

Problems - Natural russet leathers may soil easily while "making up". However, finger and tool stain marks may often be lifted with a mild bleaching solution (1 tablespoon of Oxalic Acid to 1 pint of water). When using any bleaching agent, take the precaution of wiping over work with clear water dampened swab, as any concentrate of bleaching agent left in the leather may seriously affect subsequent hand colouring operations.

Oxidizing of Natural Russet Leathers
- Some russet leathers "mellow" rapidly; all mellow eventually . The same oxidizing process takes place on many light-to-medium dark toned leathers - particularly with aniline dyed leathers. This effect, if produced evenly, is not necessarily undesirable. In fact, it is often hoped and planned for by skilful

craftsmen that their work appear more "mellow" after use over a period of weeks or months or even years.

Often, however, beginners are disappointed when they plan to "leave their work natural" and expect it to stay in the same light tone after use for a season as when articles were first completed. To learn what will happen to "natural" leather when left uncoloured or when just superficially finished, students may observe the strong oxidizing effects of sunlight (or daylight) on russet leathers, by putting a strip in the window, half covered with a close fitting brown paper sleeve. Pull the sleeve back a couple of inches every other day for a week and notice the distinct gradations of "mellowing". Multiply this effect of one week's light exposure the "natural finished" article will receive during a whole summer of outdoor use, and the beginner may think twice about leaving his work natural.

Unless natural leathers are frequently refinished with cleaning solutions and neutral creams or waxes, they tend to absorb finger and hand marks which in time become so ingrained into the surface fibres as to permanently soil the original fresh appearance. While there are methods which students may study and practise applying clear shellacs, lacquers or waxes to natural russet articles, the more experienced craftsman prefers to treat his leathers with at least a light toning of colouring medium.

Remember - as different leathers take the same dyes differently, from piece to piece and even from area to area of the same hide, the careful craftsman will ALWAYS experiment or test on scrap leather of the type to be used in major projects.

Fine leatherwork demands sufficient finishing time. Therefore, remember also, that when you spend hours, days, or weeks, designing, decorating, and preparing major work for assembly, you risk spoiling your work and wasting your time and materials if you rush your leathercraft finishing operations.

The more you study the craft of hand colouring and finishing natural russet leathers, the more you will enjoy leathercraft and have your work admired by others.

Deane H Russell

Deane Russell was one of the founding members of the Society. He started leathercraft at the YMCA Golden Lake Summer Camp in 1938. For five years he was the Secretary for the Interdepartmental Committee on Canadian Hand Arts and Crafts for the Dominion Government. In 1946, Deane Russell wrote a feature column "Leathercraft Lobby" for "RA NEWS". This was a monthly newspaper for the Civil Service Recreation Association. He organized Canada's two largest leathercraft exhibitions. The 1948 display included entries from coast to coast in Canada and from 14 Foreign Countries. He resigned from the Dominion Civil Services after 12 years to undertake full-time management of the Ottawa Valley Leathercraft Studios. In 1950, Deane Russell was appointed President of the newly formed Canadian Society of Creative Leathercraft. In 1951, he was appointed Editor of the newly formed "Canadian Leathercraft". His early work commissions were a photograph frame presented to the President of the United States; A book cover presented to the Emperor of Ethiopia; and photograph folders presented to visiting Chiefs of Staff, European Armies.
